On Friday 27th January, the Green team took part in the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch. We spent an hour across the infant and junior playground counting all of the birds that we could see. We had lots of fun! We had a guide of different species that we could use to identify the birds. In total, we saw:

67 Woodpigeons 18 Blackbirds 2 Blue Tits 14 House sparrows 1 Long-tailed tit 1 Greenfinch 30 Magpies 1 Great tit 1 Robin 3 Coal tits 12 Collared doves



We entered this information on the RSPB website. We linked our work to the Catholic Social Teaching Principle of Care for Creation. We discussed how we are Stewards of Creation and that we need to look after the world that God has made for us. We will now think of ways in which we can feed and care for the birds to make our school environment more wildlife friendly. Watch this space!

RECALL everyday activities that costs money and use electricity;


EXPLAIN how you can save money by being more sustainable;
